



Now Here will respond to the Life-Saving Station's building site and history, most specifically its "faking box" — the emblematic artifact in the Station's collection that emanates the mission of the Station — to save lives— while in itself embodying a formal aesthetic, one that relates to the Collective's original artifact and inspiration, the Metropolitan Museum's Marshallese Navigation Chart. Art installations will represent the artists' non-literal creative perspectives on these inspirations.

The exhibition will be accompanied by educational talks and panels with the artists as well as family workshops to supplement the site-specific installation experience.

Main Beach, 101 Ocean Avenue, East Hampton

In collaboration with Guild Hall's Museum Director/Chief Curator Christina Strassfield, artist Warren Neidich will curate performances and time-based exhibitions at Main Beach on select Saturdays in East Hampton. *Swept Away* is meant to take place at the water's edge between 6-10PM, and the syncopated sound of the surf will provide the background acoustics. This poetic project in some ways harkens back to the "Happenings" staged by Allan Kaprow across the South Fork in 1966.

Artists living on the East End will be asked to participate in momentary performative gestures of immateriality, like making sandcastles, singing a song, reciting poetry, making a sculpture that interacts with the tide, using natural color dyes to make temporary paintings in the tide, skywriting, and more.



Stirring the Pot returns for its 11th season with host Florence Fabricant, food and wine writer for *The New York Times*, at three dynamic off-site locations. The series begins at the new Montauk outpost of the high-profile Brooklyn pizzeria Roberta's, with a mozzarella-making demonstration and lunch. The second installation, at Sagaponack Farm Distillery, will focus on the Foster family's 6th generation farm, the products that go into their spirits, the process of distilling, and a "happy hour" cocktail-making demo including drinks and snacks. The series will close out at The Hayground School with a talk, demo, and tasting by world-famous Chef Eric Ripert of Le Bernardin, who is also a local resident, focusing on summer produce and his latest book *Vegetable Simple*. The series will also be live-streamed for those who cannot attend in person.

At this one-night-only performance, the world champion beatboxers of The Beatbox House and leading street dancers representing Krump, Flex, and Break Dancing will embark on an adventure of sound and movement. All music and sound featured is 100% human-generated, and creative directors Chris Celiz, a world champion beatboxer, and b-boy Anthony Vito Rodriguez "Invertebrate" have assembled a formidable cast to push the vocal boundaries into the unimaginable.

The **RESISTANCE REVIVAL CHORUS** is a collective of more than 60 womxn who join together to breathe joy and song into the resistance, and to uplift and center women's voices. Chorus members are touring musicians, film and television actors, Broadway performers, solo recording artists, gospel singers, political activists, educators, filmmakers, artists, and more, representing a multitude of identities, professions, creative backgrounds, and activist causes.

As part of their 2022 Tour, the Resistance Revival Chorus will present a concert featuring original anthems from their 2020 album, *This Joy*. The album features original compositions along with protest classics and was recorded in New York City with GRAMMY-nominated producer Tiffany Gouché.

A unique feature to the Resistance Revival Chorus' program in East Hampton is a week-long residency with East Hampton High School. Chorus Member Meah Pace will lead the choir in the composition of their own original anthem and teach them repertoire from the Resistance Revival Chorus to be performed as part of the June 3 concert.

The Guild Hall William P. Rayner Artist-in-Residence program offers artist collectives the time and space to research, experiment, and develop new ideas and projects. Artists are provided with creative mentorships and administrative support, a commissioning fee, living space, and a purpose-built studio on a stunning private property in East Hampton.

Throughout several 2-4 weeklong residencies, residents connect with accomplished artists, community leaders, and philanthropists at weekly salon dinners. They receive mentorship from select members of the Guild Hall Academy of the Arts and professional staff, while visiting artist studios, cultural centers, and the natural landscape of the Hamptons.

Residents are invited to the program by a committee of celebrated artists, creative professionals, members of Guild Hall's Academy of the Arts, and Senior Leadership.

Student Art Festival: Eco vs. Ego explores our symbiotic relationship with nature. Led by Landscape Designer and Guest Thought Leader, Edwina von Gal, SAF Eco vs. Ego asks students, schoolteachers, and artists to delve into topics such as Needs/Survival: Shelter, Food, Water; Infrastructure & Growth; Anthropomorphism & Symbolism; and Biophilia, through the practice of art, design, horticulture, and performance.

Core to the Festival is the SAF In-School Artist-in-Residence program, which began in 2021 with 6 local artists helping over 150 students in 5 different schools to create work for the 2021 Student Art Festival: Past-Present-Future. The program has grown in 2022 to 23 artists working with 14 participating schools and over 4,000 students to research, experiment, and produce works throughout the 2022-2023 school years, culminating in a festival of exhibitions and performances in January and February, 2024.

GUILD HALL TEEN ARTS COUNCIL

Founded in the Spring of 2017, Guild Hall's Teen Arts Council (GHTAC) is a group of motivated and creative young people working as paid employees of Guild Hall to inspire their peers to develop a passion for and voice within the contemporary arts, and to advance their own creativity through devising, producing, and participating in creative interactions, public programs, and special projects.

The 2021-2022 GHTAC consists of 21 High School aged teenagers from three different school districts. Throughout the year members have worked closely with artists from Guild Hall's Residency program and collaborations with regional arts intuitions, such as the DIA Art Foundation, shadowed Guild Hall staff during public programs and development events, and most notably, collaborated with the Plain Sight Project on a public-work, "Marks of Enslavement" to be installed throughout the Village of East Hampton in June 2022.

Teens are admitted to GHTAC through an application and interview process. Applications for the 2022-2023 Council will open in June 2022.
